Dear Friends

Have you ever noticed how many aspects of social media tend to be viewed with a certain amount of scepticism and even animosity? I suppose it's not surprising really, anyone can post anything they want so, scandal, outrage and "Fake

News" often seem to be the prevalent order of the day. However, every so often a "Good News" story will appear that restores your faith in humanity and makes you realise that it is worth keeping your Facebook or Twitter account.

One such story appeared this week and seems to have gone viral for all the right reasons. It told of an 11 year old on his first day at a new school in Liverpool who managed to board the wrong bus home. With no money, phone or friends around him all he could do was sit and get progressively more worried as he found himself getting further and further away from where he needed to be. That was until a 15 year old lad noticed him sitting on his own looking very upset. Now, to be honest, in many schools these older pupils will have nothing to do with the new year 7's so the fact that his plight was noticed in the first place is quite unusual, but then this lad did something really special. Not only did he stop the bus so the boy could get off quickly, but he also gave him £10 out of his own



pocket for a taxi home, then two of his friends found the number of a local cab firm, phoned for a taxi and accompanied him safely back to his parents. As if that wasn't enough, the Taxi driver waived his fee. I think you would agree that this was the sort of story that we all like to hear about.

It is a story that revolved around one person in need and four very special "Hero's of the hour" who came to his aid that day. The one who noticed the boy and stepped in, the two who stayed with him and the Taxi driver who drove him home free of charge. Each one was willing to give him their attention, their time, their money and their care and concern.

Well all, this got me thinking (Surprise surprise), indeed I thought of two things. How good are we at noticing when someone is in trouble? And if we do, are we always willing to step in and help? How generous are we in being prepared to offer our attention, time and money to those who need it?

Chrisyne Zerafa hails from Malta and Philip Attard from the island of Gozo. Both studied in Malta before coming to the UK

for post-graduate studies. They have made their name as a duo playing at major chamber music venues all over Britain and Europe.

The Battle of Britain Pilot's Memorial Garden, Parkhouse Farm, Chart Sutton.

The Garden marks the site of the fatal crash of Hurricane pilot, Robert Shaw, of No.1 Squadron on the 3rd September 1940.

At that time fragmentary human remains were interred at Milton Cemetery, Sittingbourne, and therefore the site

must never be referred to as a grave.

Although contractors removed surface debris which included the serial number of the aircraft, and the pilot's name was generally known, the authorities were adamant for many years that his identity could not be confirmed. Thus he remained our 'Unknown Battle of Britain Pilot'. In the early 1980s excavation of two other local crash sites allowed, by elimination, the pilot's identity to be officially confirmed and members of his family were able to attend the Service, and have remained very supportive ever since.

In 1940 an old couple living nearby planted a rose bush on the site and maintained an informal garden.

In September 1970 the site was adoped by The Royal Air Forces Association and the first formal Memorial Service was held in Chart Sutton Church followed by



a wreath laying at the site. This annual event continues to this day and is often graced by a flypast by the Battle of Britain Memorial Flight. On the 21st August 2011 the Lancaster, Hurricane and Spitfire flew low over the site.

During the late 1970s

the C.in C. Strike Command attended and took the salute at the parade, which was attended by The Queen's Colour Squadron and The Central Band. Also at this time Dame Anna Neagle twice attended, reading lessons and laying wreaths at the Memorial Garden.

In 2017 Sir Hugh Robertson attended in his role of Deputy Lieutenant. The event is also usually attended by The Mayor of Maidstone.

The site is situated on a private farm and Headcorn Branch are grateful to the farmer for allowing access to maintain the garden, and opening it to invited guests on the afternoon of the Annual Service. The Branch are very grateful to the dedicated few who have worked so hard over many years to maintain this beautiful memorial.

Council will be setting its budget for 2019/20 and would love to know if any parishioners have any projects that they would like the Parish Council to consider that would benefit the Parish.



What is The Three Suttons Helpline?

The Three Suttons Helpline has been operating as a "good neighbour" scheme for about 20 years to make life easier for those needing to get to medical appointments, but who do not have their own transport or cannot easily be helped by family or friends and for whom public transport is infrequent and not a viable option. This scheme covers the villages and surgeries in Sutton Valence, Chart Sutton, East Sutton, Kingswood and Langley.

The Helpline is operated entirely by volunteers who are not paid for their work:

the three ladies who answer telephone requests and arrange the journeys and the 20 volunteer drivers. Donations from the users of the scheme pay towards telephone calls and petrol costs. A number of the local parish councils and a local charity have kindly donated money which goes towards insurance, publicity and other costs.

Noticeboard

Pear and hazelnut cake



Ingredients

100g blanched hazelnuts

140g self-raising flour

175g butter, cut into small pieces

140g brown sugar

2 large eggs, beaten

3 semi-ripe packham pears

50g dark chocolate, chopped into small chunks

Method

- Preheat the oven to 140C for fan-forced (160C conventional).
- Butter and line the base of a 25 x 11centimetre loaf cake tin with baking paper.
- Grind the hazelnuts in a food processor until fairly fine. Add the flour and mix briefly. Add the butter and pulse until it forms crumbs. Add the sugar and eggs and mix briefly.
- Peel, core and chop one-and-a-half pears into a small dice. Stir the pears and chocolate lightly into the cake mixture. Spoon the mixture into the prepared tin and smooth the top.
- Peel, core and slice the remaining pears and arrange on the top of the cake. Press down lightly and bake for 50-60 minutes, until a skewer comes out clean when inserted in the middle.
- Cool in the tin for 10 minutes, then turn out and cool on a wire rack. Dust with icing sugar.



October Jottings

The beginning of September may not have felt like the start of autumn; there was still a reasonable amount of warmth to be had from the midday sun and the fifth and final test match against the Indian cricketers was still to be played at the Oval. However, the diminishing

duration of daylight hours was already becoming noticeable and now, at the beginning of October, the sun is below the horizon each night for longer than it is above it each day. My almanac tells me that the Anglo-Saxons called this month Winterfylleth which apparently is a reference to the October full moon which they considered to mark the beginning of winter. To us the October full moon is usually the hunters moon although, if it occurs very early in the month within two weeks of the autumnal equinox, it will be the harvest moon.

It was in the middle of October 31 years ago that large areas of southern England were devastated by the powerful remnants of a tropical hurricane. Here in the Suttons quite a few large trees were uprooted and



many buildings were badly damaged. Almost 30 years to the day last October another storm that further to the south-west of the British Isles had been hurricane Ophelia swept up the west side of Ireland and on into Scotland and, like its predecessor, caused

considerable damage in those parts of the British Isles. The southerly wind associated with it here in Kent not only gave us unseasonable warmth but also a strange afternoon light with a very orange sun shining through an overcast sky. It was, apparently, a combination of Saharan dust and ash from Portuguese wildfires carried high into the atmosphere that produced this effect.

Encourage green tomatoes to ripen by wrapping them in a paper bag with one red tomato to show them how it is done!

When lifting onions, leave stalks attached

which will allow them to be tied into 'ropes' – then hang in a cool dry store.

Potatoes: On a dry day dig up the last of your crop and spread out to dry on your 'patch' before storage. Keep in hessian sacks and store them in a cool frost proof shed and cover with an old blanket to exclude light.

Preparing ground for autumn and winter - Whilst digging do not remove stones, they help to maintain a good soil structure, improve drainage and keep soil moist in summer.

Heavy autumn rain can damage soil structure and cause erosion – Protect any areas of bare ground with a mulch of well rotted manure, compost or leaf-mould which will add nutrients and organic matter over time. If you have the space collect the falling leaves which will make excellent leaf mould. They are better kept separate from the compost bin if you have the room!

Remove stakes and canes that were used to support plants during the season. Brush off soil, wash them with disinfectant and store in a dry shed / garage.

Plant Spring cabbages 10 – 12" apart in rows 12" apart firming them well in.

17th October each year using root trainers with John Innes potting compost. Protect in greenhouse or cold frame.

Rhubarb crowns can be planted between

October and November.

If you wish to naturalize daffodils in a lawn ensure you mark out the area so it is not walked on!

GREENHOUSE – Water greenhouse plants only in the morning during the winter months so that by nightfall the atmosphere is dry.

Insulate the greenhouse by putting up a layer of bubble wrap which can be secured to the frame with clips or drawing pins depending on whether you have a metal or wooden greenhouse. If like us you use your greenhouse to give extra protection for over wintering then we also use fleece around precious plants!

If you still have some energy left then carry on digging as it will help to prepare a seed bed. Once dug this can be protected over winter with old carpet or black plastic weighted down to prevent weed regrowth. In Spring the soil should be warm and will only need hoeing before starting off the spring seed bed.
