CLERGY LETTER

Dear friends

I have to admit that, despite the continued uncertainties surrounding the Corona Virus, my life has taken a real upward turn recently – several reasons, but one of the main ones is the return of a much loved Television series from my youth. All Creatures Great and Small has been remade, is back on our screens (Channel 5 at 9pm on Tuesdays) and is just as enjoyable as the original version. It always was a wonderful programme, with likeable but often quirky characters, good story lines and of course the wonderful Yorkshire Dales scenery that took me back to several very happy holidays that Graham & I enjoyed in that part of the country.

In particular, I was reminded of our annual trips to Rievaulx Abbey, which while lovely in itself, was made all the more spectacular by the journey which took us from the picturesque Yorkshire Coast, across the moors and through Ryedale with its very pretty villages and market towns. Keith and Jean's Garden Jottings



Here we are again with Autumn on the doorstep, there will still be plenty of leaves falling in our gardens, some would call it a 'chore' having to rake up the Autumn harvest, others will really appreciate the changing leaves and of course we can rake up the leaves and put into black bags for mulching round our plants once the leaves have decayed.

Plant tulip bulbs now, most varieties should be planted quite deeply, about 15-20 cm down. Try interspersing tulips, among spring flowering bedding such as wallflowers, polyanthus, forget-me-not, bellis daisy, sometimes known as Belisima, pansy and other varieties for their early blooms. Planting patio pots in layered tiers provides a continuity of flowering over several weeks.

Carefully dig up dahlia tubers once their leaves are blackened by the first frost. Lift and divide congested clumps of perennial flowers.

Draw earth up around leeks to help blanch their stems. Plant out garlic cloves and pot up parsley and other herbs to use as fresh over winter.

Sow sweet peas in pots and grow them in a cold frame over winter to plant out in April. Plant evergreen shrubs, conifers and hedging while the soil still retains some warmth.

Finish harvesting vegetable crops,



potatoes and carrots for winter store.

With the daylight fading at this time of year, it becomes a pleasure to draw the curtains, get out the board games and other treasures such as puzzles which makes a change from the television screen! We can also get out the seed catalogues and plan as well as order something new to enhance our garden for the year ahead. Enjoy!

Many will know that Colonel Peter Garratt died in his care home on 24th August this year. After living for many years in the Sutton Valence and Headcorn area, Peter and Valerie Garratt moved to be nearer to their daughter in

Middleton-on-Sea, West Sussex in 2014. Valerie sadly died soon after the move.

After a long career in the Army (the Royal Corps of Signals) in which he achieved the very senior rank of full Colonel, and many homes in different parts of the world, Peter and Valerie moved to Sutton Valence - 'Kantara' at the bottom of the hill - in 1977 and quickly became regular members of the St Mary's congregation. Both of them joined the choir, and continued to sing until shortly before they moved to West Sussex, when Peter decided to give up driving. They then quickly became well-loved members of the Headcorn congregation. They were both the most faithful of choir members and would come up from Church Walk in Headcorn, to where they moved in 1982, in all weathers and at all times of day.

Valerie and Peter both served on St Mary's Parochial Church Council for many years, Peter holding just about every office. Both were on the Social and Fund-raising Committee and

contributed wisely to the discussions and, most importantly, took a large part in organising events, and in organising other people to do things. Peter did, indeed, do pretty much everything and did it superbly. He was PCC

member, Churchwarden, PCC Treasurer, Lay Reader, applicant for liquor licences for many events over many years, barman, and wise counsel to successive Vicars. He was Editor of Weald Views until he moved to West Sussex; he was one of the church's representatives on the Parish Room (as it then was) Committee and was its Treasurer for many years. With other members of the Committee he was largely responsible for getting it on to a sound footing, both financially and in its governance. He was St Mary's representative on the Deanery Synod (in the various Deaneries in which the parish found itself from time to time) for many years. The list is almost endless

Peter had a deep, personal and unshakeable faith in his Lord and, of all he did, probably enjoyed most and got the greatest satisfaction from his ministry as a Lay Reader, and Reader (different only because 'they' changed the name of the role), in all of the three Suttons churches. He trained with Keith

Smith in two years of evening and weekend sessions (with, apparently, some hilarious journeys to and from Canterbury). Over the next 22 years, Peter officiated at many Matins and Evensong services and acted as a Chalice Assistant and he was able to ensure that parish clergy had the benefit of occasional Sunday evenings off. His sermons always got to the heart of the matter and nearly always raised a smile or two around the church. Valerie was, of course, his sternest critic, but was also his trial congregation before the service, so she always heard his sermons at least twice.

You don't fill gaps like these easily or quickly.

Peter and I spent many happy hours sailing his boat off Falmouth while Brenda and Valerie were spending money onshore (Valerie having first ensured we had a good lunch with a beer or two each – Doom Bar, of course – with us).

Peter's ashes will be interred in St Mary's churchyard in due course, when he will be physically re-united with Valerie.

Rest in Peace, old friend and shipmate (to which he would have retorted "not so much of the 'old', thank you very much").

As I write these jottings half way through September in order to meet the deadline for material for the October magazine, the memory of

and so that we don't have to keep correcting our clocks and watches (for which every hour of every day is exactly the same length) the duration of

the miserable August Bank Holiday weather is still quite fresh; although it didn't rain there was not much sunshine and it was nowhere near as warm as one would have hoped. And now, at the end of the second week of autumn we are enjoying a brief Indian summer. Indian summers are welcome at any time in the autumn so let's hope we get another spell of unseasonably warm weather in October. What a strange nine months of weather we have had so far this year!

The autumnal equinox was on September 23 this year but, had you checked the times of sunrise and sunset in that day's newspapers, you might have wondered why they weren't at 6 a.m. and 6 p.m. G.M.T. and why they were a little over 12 hours apart. The answer to the first question is that the length of a day varies slightly throughout the year

each day from midday one day to midday the following day throughout the whole year is averaged to give us Greenwich Mean Time. In fact, there is little difference between solar time and G.M.T. at the autumnal equinox but it is more marked at the vernal equinox in March. The answer to the second question is that, because the atmosphere bends light rays passing through it, we see the sun very shortly before it is physically above the horizon in the morning and we don't lose sight of it until very shortly after it has physically sunk below the horizon in the evening.

At this time of year we are well aware that our daylight hours are diminishing week by week but what a difference it makes when the sky is virtually cloudless rather than heavily overcast in the morning and evening!

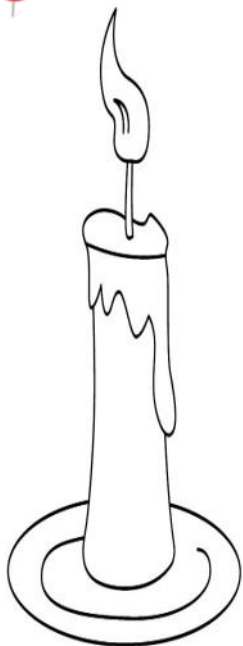

Church of England and RSCM await next steps following study into singing safety

The Church of England and Royal School of Church Music (RSCM) have been awaiting updated guidance on singing in places of worship after findings of a Government-backed study were published.

The research project, known as 'PERFORM', recently published its findings on measuring aerosol production from humans. It measured singing, speaking and breathing in a zero-background environment.

Researchers reported a steep rise in aerosol mass with increase in the loudness of the singing and speaking,

rising by as much as a factor of 20-30. However, it was also found that singing does not produce substantially more aerosol than speaking at a similar volume.

The RSCM's Director, Hugh Morris said: "We welcome this news. Singing is of such importance in worship, and this is a really encouraging step towards its safe resumption.

"It is of course vital that all choirs and singing groups follow the relevant government advice, and so we look forward to receiving the latest guidance in this important area." The Church of England and RSCM both regularly update their advice following the publication of Government guidance.
